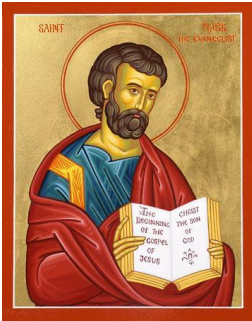

Feb 16: The End of Mark and the re-beginning of the Gospel story

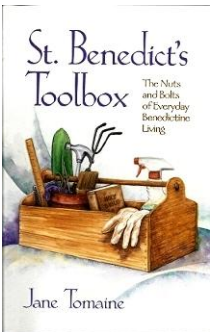

“The book is full of great ideas, but I never would have put them into practice if I hadn’t had a group to motivate me.”

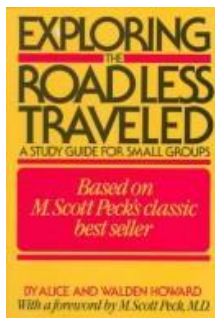

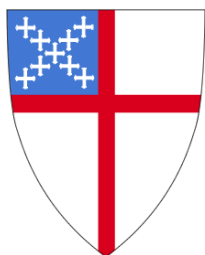
