T-ACT Phone Banking on Tuesday Nights

Please join other members of our congregation in phone banking in Room C at Trinity, starting at 5:30 pm every Tuesday evening between now and the November 4 election. Members of various churches throughout our community are calling low-frequency voters to remind them to vote. You will be trained to give voters a few facts about Proposition 47, which reclassifies specific non-violent crimes as misdemeanors. This ballot measure would save law enforcement resources for serious crimes and redirect \$2.1 million in savings to rehabilitation of lower level offenders, mental health and drug treatment and the school systems in California. In the past 20 years, California has built 22 prisons and only one university. But building more prisons hasn't solved the problem of crime; some of us believe it is time to take a new tack.
